The Bush Administration requested \$131.9 billion in federal research and development (RD) funding for FY2005. This is \$5.9 billion above the estimated \$126 billion that was appropriated for federal RD in FY2004. The President's RD request mirrors recent past proposals with large increases for defense and homeland security RD, while the remaining agencies are proposed to receive modest increases or reductions in their respective research programs. All FY2004 civilian RD funding figures include required rescissions. For FY2005, total defense RD (the sum of the Department of Defense's (DOD) RD programs and the Department of Energy's (DOE) defense-related RD activities) is proposed to increase 6.4 to \$74.2 billion, while civilian RD would increase 2.7 to \$57.7 billion. For FY2005, defense RD would account for 56 of all federal RD expenditures, while civilian RD would account for 44 . The House has passed 12 of its appropriations bills and the Senate six. Congress has passed four appropriations bills, but only two of the bills, Defense and Homeland Security, have RD programs. Congress approved a record \$69.853 billion...
